*Updated High Desert Sign Policy* – The High Desert Board approved a modification to the High Desert Sign Policy at the November Board Meeting. Section G of that policy, Temporary or Special Event Signs, was edited to clarify requirements for signs related to Elections, Estate Sales, Studio Tours, and Parade of Homes and Gardens. #### Fall Clean-Up for Fire Preparedness

The City of ABQ will have Fall Green Waste pick-up on your regular trash day from Nov. 28 – Dec. 10th. No appointment is necessary. Just leave your bags – any color will do – by 7 am at the curb near your other trash bins. They will take any green waste, including tree branches if they are cut to a minimum of 4 feet in length and bundled. They will not take dirt, soil, gravel, or any not vegetative material.

Where should you focus on fire preparedness around your home?

- Ignition Zone clear all dead material in the 6 feet around your home and remove lawn furniture, etc. that you may have used earlier in the year.
- Defensible Zone reduce the fuel load and fire risk out to 30 feet from your home if your lot is that big.

What 6 things should you do to be prepared for fire?

- Clear dead materials on the ground like leaves, pine needles and cones, tumble weeds and dead annual plants.
- Trim off dried foliage from perennial plants and trim grasses to 4 inches. In areas more than 6
  feet from the house, you can leave some leaves for insects and birds to forage in during the
  winter. Quails, for one, nest under bushes. And remember to provide water for wildlife.
- Remove bushes and grasses from beneath trees and separate large bushes to prevent fire spreading from bush to bush.
- Reduce the dead, dry undergrowth from bushes and trim them to no more than 3-4 feet high to reduce the fuel load and stimulate healthy spring renewal.
- Trim tree branches a minimum of 2 feet and up to 4 feet from the ground to reduce chance of fire under or near the tree creating a ladder fuel situation.
- Separate trees and bushes. Tree branches should be more than 10 feet from the house or from other trees to prevent fire spreading. Bushes are safest if not near each other. Limbs must not hang over the roof.
