Complete the relevant fields on the SOI and submit the form electronically by clicking "Send."

Once you submit an SOI, the Nominating Committee will reach out to schedule an informational meeting with you during the week of April 10, and a Meet and Greet with the Voting Members on April 22, where you will have an opportunity to present your case for being a board member. New High Desert Security Patrol – The VetSec security patrol transition from Allied occurred on February 1st. In preparation, VetSec worked directly with Allied to train onsite, with the current guards, to best understand the patrol patterns and predominant issues and concerns for High Desert. All equipment is being turned over from Allied to VetSec for a seamless transition, including the security phone which will continue to have the same contact number (505-485-5658). VetSec will be working with modern technology to document (with photos) all incidents in the community, providing management with daily reports so that the community can stay ahead of emergent issues.

By-Laws Updated – The Voting Members approved an update to the High Desert By-Laws to make them compliant with the 2019 New Mexico HOA Act. High Desert was already required to

follow the HOA Act but the changes ensure the By-Laws reflect state law. The biggest changes are opening Board Meetings and Annual Meetings to all High Desert owners (in addition to Voting Members), adding notification requirements for policy discussions, and specifically listing association records that owners can review. Monthly Village Spotlight:

The Aerie - The Aerie is one of the earliest villages in the High Desert. It was envisioned by developers as a starter-home development, but it has been warmly embraced by "empty nesters" as well. The 74 single-family lots are mostly freestanding patio homes (though there are a few joined townhomes), all finished in the Territorial style. Two locked pedestrian gates allow residents to stroll onto Spain at the east- and westernmost points of the Aerie, but vehicle traffic enters through a single point on Cortaderia Place. The developers of the Aerie creatively zoned the village to allow a pleasant patio space for the residents of every house in the Aerie, and most of these yards have terraces and Xeric Garden features to become "outdoor rooms" that bring family living areas outside where families can enjoy our wonderful New Mexico weather.
